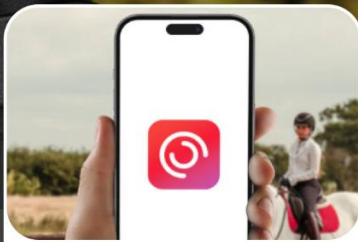

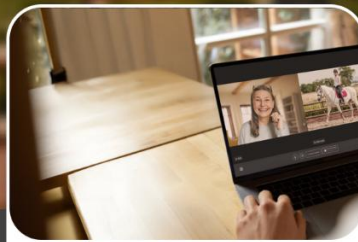

Step 1: Set-Up Or Confirm Your Account Information

- a) Go to www.spotlighthorseshows.com.
- a) If you previously entered a Spotlight Horse Show, please reset your password. Review your account data.
 - b) If you are new to Spotlight Horse Shows, create a new account. You will be asked for your horse, rider, and owner information. That information will now be stored in your profile for easy entry. Your Horse Shows, Videos Signs, and Video Link Status will all be found here on your profile page.

- a) You are now ready to enter a show. The home screen will display currently active shows as well as the division(s) included. Click on a show to enter. You can late enter a show that is already closed, if it is not past the video submission date. A \$25 late fee will automatically be added to your entry. You can also plan ahead by clicking the View Full Calendar Button. Please review the prize list for each show you are entering.

- b) Once you have determined which show you want to enter, click the "Enter Show" Button.

- d) On the left side of the screen, select the competitor and horse for this entry or add a new one.
 e) Select the division(s) you wish to enter.

Qualifying

- Enter any Spotlight Dressage show designated as a qualifier
- Riders who score a minimum of 60% at the highest test of the level are automatically qualified for the **Level Championship** at the on-line Semi-Finals.
- Enter all classes of the level in the same show to be eligible for the **All-Around Championship** for that level. Average score must be a minimum of 60% to advance.
- See list of available classes in prize list.

SEMI-FINALS

- There are 7 regions.
- Riders with the minimum scores of 60% advance to the National Finals for both the Level and All-Around Championships.

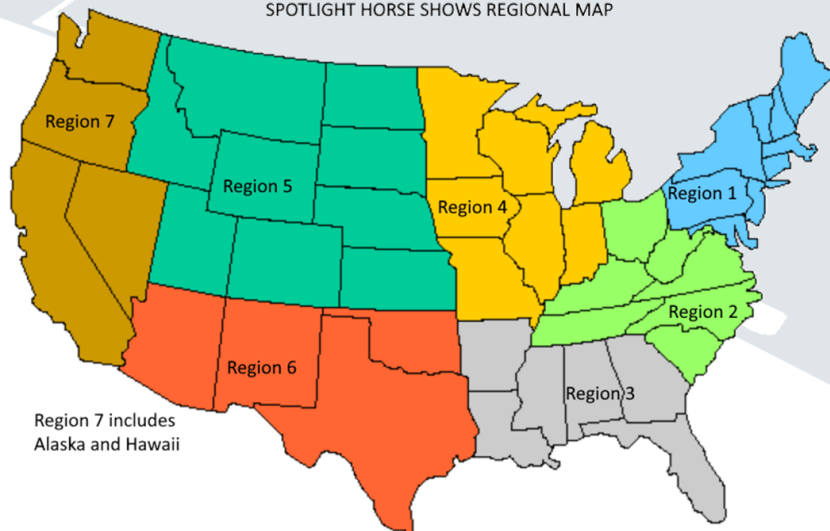

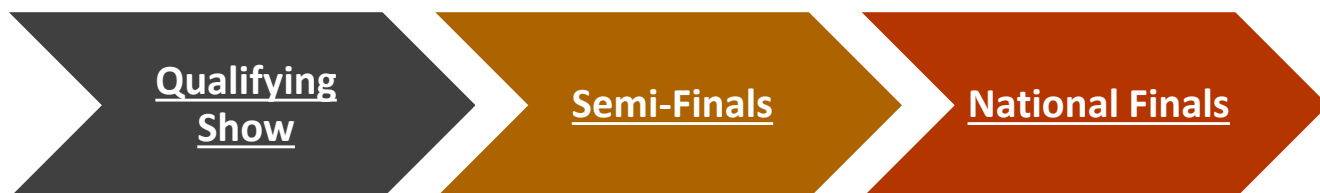

- Payment: Entries must be completed online at SpotlightHorseShows.com with online entry form by the closing date.
- Payment is accepted through PayPal or credit card. All fees are in US dollars.
- One show office entry fees allows the same horse and rider team to cross-enter divisions.
- Horse, rider, or class changes are subject to a \$25 change fee.
- Late entries are subject to a \$25 late fee.
- Refunds: Entries canceled for any reason prior to the closing date will be refunded, minus the show office fee. There are no refunds after the closing date. In the event the competition is canceled, Total Entry Fees minus the office fee will be refunded. Thank you for understanding.

Tips on Filming with your Pivo.

Here are some guidelines and links for assistance when using your Pivo.

- Practice with your unit prior to scheduling your film date to determine the best settings and placement for your arena surroundings. Keep note of your preferred settings and camera placement and use them each time you record.
- Check your camera settings.
 - Resolution: 1080p HD settings provide excellent detail for the judges.
 - You can also change the feet per second (fps) recording speed for your recording.
 - Make sure your lens is clean.
- Make sure your camera is level and is vertically plumb in the Pivo unit.
- Make sure the camera is connected to the Pivo unit.
- Refer to the [Pivo Setup Guide for Equestrians](#) for excellent reference materials.
- There are multiple modes for filming, but first try the one Pivo specifically developed for filming online shows.
- Pivo Horse Tracking Tips and Tricks are provided [here](#).
- Riders report good contrasting colors help with tracking
- If you have mirrors in your arena, have the mirrors behind the camera. Or, place the camera at standing eye height to help with tracking.
- You must start your camera when you show the video sign. The video sign may be a sheet of paper that you fold up and put in your pocket or placed on something more firm like a clipboard or transparent folder.
- You should plan on 45 second from the start of your film to when you comes down centerline

Dressage & Eventing Apparel, Equipment, and Video Rules

Equipment Guidelines

You are responsible for knowing the correct rules for tack and equipment.

If you are familiar with (and follow) USDF tack rules, you will be legal for this show. Here are some important guidelines to follow.

- An English saddle with stirrups is required
- Saddle pads are optional and should be of one conservative color. Accents are allowed.
- Seat covers are not allowed
- No wraps or boots of any kind are allowed above the coronet band
- Bridles with bits are required
- Reins must be used and constructed of leather, leather-like, or webbing. Rubber coated reins and rein steps are allowed.
- One whip of 120 cm (47.2 inches) or shorter is allowed.
- No double bridles at Second Level or below
- Breastplates and cruppers are allowed
- Side reins or other gadgets are not allowed.
- Fly hoods without ear plugs are allowed
- Braiding is not required.

Apparel Guidelines

- Clean, neat, and tidy schooling show dress for qualifier shows is allowed, but full competition dress is required in some shows such as the US National Dressage Classic championship classes. See the prize list for details.
- Jackets are not required. If worn, a short jacket must be used for Fourth Level and below. For FEI classes, a coat with tails is allowed.
- All shirts must have sleeves and some form of collar. T-shirts are not allowed.
- A properly fastened safety helmet is required.
- Vests, rain jackets, or cold weather parkas are allowed.

Video Rules

You may film your ride as soon as you have your sign. Videos must be in focus. Remember, the judge can only score what they can see, so follow these guidelines carefully!

IMPORTANT! Show Management will review all submissions to ensure adherence to the rules as stated below. If a test does not comply with the rules, Show Management will contact the exhibitor immediately via email, text, or phone. The exhibitor will have 48 hours to resubmit their test from the time of the notification. Please take all guidelines into consideration when preparing your test submissions.

- Use arenas that are as close to regulation size as possible and be sure letters are set appropriately to be viewed by the judge. Cones with large letters on them and poles on the ground to delineate the corners are acceptable. Large letters taped on walls work as well. If a test allows for the use of either the large or small arena, you may show in either size.
- To ensure that only videos taped for this competition are used, videos of tests must be unedited from start to finish, starting at the video sign and ending with the equipment check. It must be one continuous recording with the horse and rider visible from the moment they come down centerline. Tests with edits will not be accepted.
- Bridle and saddle pad numbers are not allowed.
- Videos must be filmed in LANDSCAPE orientation.
- The natural background sound for the test must be audible. Tests with no sound will not be accepted.
- Only video links from YouTube will be accepted. Mark the links as either public or unlisted in YouTube.
- The test must be videoed from behind C, where the judge would normally be seated. Try and set the camera 4-5' off the ground. It makes the geometry easier for the judge to see.
- Prior to beginning the ride, a sign must be held up showing the show name, video date (optional), horse & rider names, class # and test description. Remove the sign just before the ride begins.
- Keep the horse in frame, paying close attention to the near corners. On the far side, you will need to zoom in for clearer judging visibility.
- Make sure to keep the letters in the frame that are elements of the test being performed.
- Calling of Tests: The test pattern may be called except for FEI and freestyles rides.
- Coaching during the test is not allowed.
- Equipment Check:
 - As soon as the test is finished, the camera must slowly circle the horse showing the entire side of the horse (including the feet.) Zoom in show details of the spurs and bit/bridle.
 - Show the entire horse, including the legs and feet.
 - Zoom in for 3 seconds so the details of the spurs, bridle and bit are visible.
 - If the videographer is unable to enter the arena, at G the rider may turn the horse slowly, wait five seconds, then turn slowly to show the second side, and wait an additional 5 seconds to complete filming of the equipment.
 - It is permissible to exit the arena for the tack check, as long as the camera stays on the horse the entire time.
 - The rider then dismounts and shows that 2 fingers will fit under the cavesson (noseband) or bosal by the side of the horse's check.

Western Dressage Apparel, Equipment, and Video Rules

Apparel and Equipment

You are responsible for knowing the correct rules for tack and equipment. USEF equipment and apparel rules apply to the Western Dressage division. For a full list of rules, refer to the USEF Rule Book. [CLICK HERE](#) to see the rules.

Video Rules

You may film your ride as soon as you have your sign. Videos must be in focus. Remember, the judge can only score what they can see, so follow these guidelines carefully!

IMPORTANT! Show Management will review all submissions to ensure adherence to the rules as stated below. If a test does not comply with the rules, Show Management will contact the exhibitor immediately via email, text, or phone. The exhibitor will have 48 hours to resubmit their test from the time of the notification. Please take all guidelines into consideration when preparing your test submissions.

- Use arenas that are as close to regulation size as possible and be sure letters are set appropriately to be viewed by the judge. Cones with large letters on them and poles on the ground to delineate the corners are acceptable. Large letters taped on walls work as well. If a test allows for the use of either the large or small arena, you may show in either size.
- To ensure that only videos taped for this competition are used, videos of tests must be unedited from start to finish, including the sign and equipment check and bosal/bridle/bit drop. It must be one continuous recording with the horse and rider visible from the moment they come down centerline. Any video with edits will not be accepted.
- Bridle and saddle pad numbers are not allowed.
- Videos must be filmed in LANDSCAPE orientation.
- The natural background sound for the test must be audible. Tests with no sound will not be accepted.
- Tests with edits will not be accepted.
- Only video links from YouTube will be accepted. Mark the links as either public or unlisted in YouTube.
- The test must be videoed from behind C, where the judge would normally be seated. Try and set the camera 4-5' off the ground. It makes the geometry easier for the judge to see.
- Prior to beginning the ride, a sign must be held up showing the show name, WDAA show recognition number, video date (optional), horse & rider names, class # and test description. Remove the sign just before the ride begins. The videographer can hold the sign then move back to behind the camera or hold the sign in front of the camera at arm's length while also holding the camera.
- Keep the horse in frame, paying close attention to the near corners. On the far side, you will need to zoom in for clearer judging visibility.
- Make sure to keep the letters in the frame that are elements of the test being performed.
- Calling of Tests: The test pattern may be called freestyles rides.
- Coaching during the test is not allowed EXCEPT for WDAA Exceptional Rider tests.
- Equipment Check:
 - As soon as the test is finished, the camera must slowly circle the horse showing the entire side of the horse (including the feet.) Zoom in show details of the spurs and bit/bridle/bosal.
 - Show the entire horse, including the legs and feet.
 - Zoom in for 3 seconds so the details of the spurs, bosal/bridle, and "bit" are visible.
 - If the videographer is unable to enter the arena, at G the rider may turn the horse slowly, wait five seconds, then turn slowly to show the second side, and wait an additional 5 seconds to complete filming of the equipment.
 - It is permissible to exit the arena for the tack check, as long as the camera stays on the horse the entire time.
 - The rider then dismounts and shows that 2 fingers will fit under the cavesson (noseband) or bosal by the side of the horse's check.
 - After putting 2 fingers under the cavesson or bosal the bridle and bit or bosal must be dropped so it can be evaluated. **Exceptional riders** are exempt from the bridle and bit/bosal dropping requirement and are not required to dismount.
 - Hold the bridle still so the bit can clearly be seen (in focus and in frame) for a minimum count of five seconds. Zoom in so details can easily be seen. Make sure the judge can see all parts of the bridle, including bit and reins clearly.
 - Do not to obscure the bit, curb strap, curb chain with your hands. Hold the equipment still for inspection.
 - A cavesson (noseband) must be shown to the camera, both inside and out. Demonstrate flexibility of the cavesson.
 - Demonstrate that the curb strap or chain is flexible and is at least ½ inch wide.
 - Bosal: After you remove the bosal, show both sides of your horse's face, unobstructed, as well as the inside of the bosal. Demonstrate flexibility its flexibility.

Driven Dressage Video Rules

Equipment Guidelines

You are responsible for knowing the American Driving Society (ADS) rules for tack and equipment. If you need a refresher, here is a link to their website. <https://www.americandrivingsociety.org/>

Video Rules

You may film your ride as soon as you have your sign. Videos must be in focus. Remember, the judge can only score what

they can see, so follow these guidelines carefully!

IMPORTANT! Show Management will review all submissions to ensure adherence to the rules as stated below. If a test does not comply with the rules, Show Management will contact the exhibitor immediately via your "My Account" portal of the Spotlight Horse Shows website. The exhibitor will have 48 hours to resubmit their test from the time of the notification. Please take all guidelines into consideration when preparing your test submissions.

- Use arenas that are as close to regulation size as possible and be sure letters are set appropriately to be viewed by the judge. Cones with large letters on them and poles on the ground to delineate the corners are acceptable. Large letters taped on walls or other types of markers work as well. Required ring sizes for the class you are showing in are also included at the ADS website. How to lay out an arena instructions are also included in the show prize list.
- To ensure that only videos taped for this competition are used, videos of tests must be unedited from start to finish, starting at the video sign and ending with final halt and exit out of the arena.
- It must be one continuous recording with the horse and rider visible from the moment they enter the arena. Tests with edits will not be accepted.
- Videos must be filmed in LANDSCAPE orientation.
- The natural background sound for the test must be audible. Tests with no sound will not be accepted.
- Only video links from YouTube will be accepted. Mark the links as either public or unlisted in YouTube prior to uploading your link to your Spotlight Horse Shows portal.
- The test must be videoed from behind C, where the judge would normally be seated. Try and set the camera 4-5' off the ground. It makes the geometry easier for the judge to see.
- Prior to beginning the ride, a sign must be held up showing the show name, video date (optional), competitor and equine names, class # and test description. Remove the sign just before the ride begins. Your video sign can be downloaded from your portal.
- Keep the equine and carriage in frame, paying close attention to the near corners. On the far side, you will need to
- zoom in for clearer judging visibility.
- Make sure to keep the letters in the frame that are elements of the test being performed.
- Coaching during the test is not allowed.

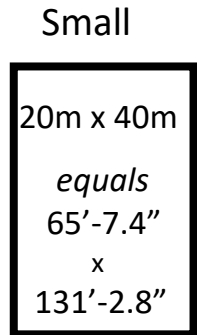
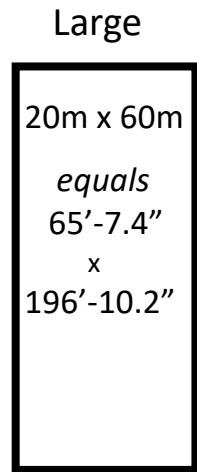
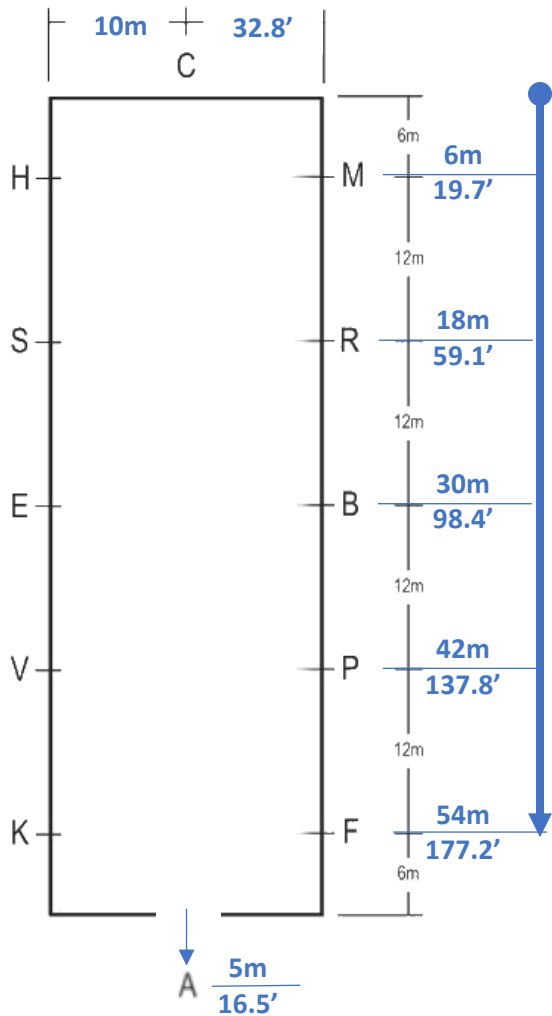
The judge will perform the equipment check as part of the judging process.

**IT IS HIGHLY RECOMMENDED THAT YOU MARK X, ESPECIALLY IN THE LARGE ARENAS.
A SMALL PILE OF SHAVINGS WORKS WELL.**

Arena Sizes for Ridden Dressage

For tests allowing for either size arena, you may use either one.

Be aware that some test call for only 1 size arena. In those cases, you must use that. Below are the dimensions needed for you to set up your arena at home.

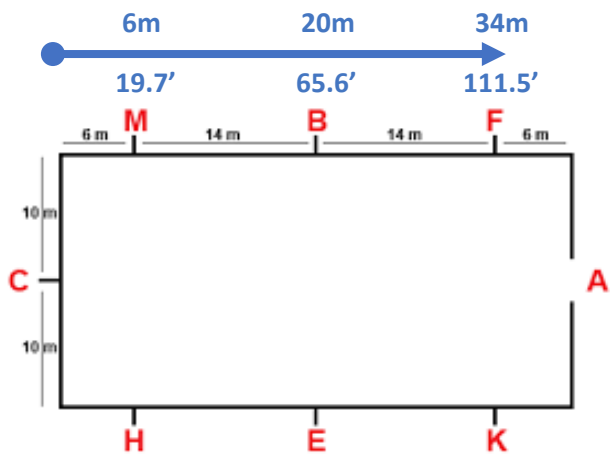


In the LARGE arena:

- Place a mark on the long rail at the following distances from the corner:
 - M: 6m = 19.7'
 - R: 18m = 59.1'
 - B: 30m = 98.4'
 - P: 42m = 137.8'
 - F: 54m = 177.2'
- Place your letters 2 feet from the rail as these marks
- Repeat on the other long side

In the SMALL arena:

- Place a mark on the long rail at the following distances from the corner:
 - M: 6m = 19.7'
 - B: 20m = 65.6'
 - F: 34m = 111.5'
- Place your letters 2 feet from the rail as these marks
- Repeat on the other long side
- C is 10m (or 32.8') in on the short side. Place that letter 2' from the rail as well.



Sport Horse In-Hand Triangle Set-up & Video Rules

Horses will stand in the "open position" for conformation judge both BEFORE and AFTER the walk and trot around the triangle. The entire horse must be in-frame at all times.

Conformation View #1

Before the walk, show the left side of the horse for at least 10 seconds.

Movement Evaluation

Horses will travel to the right (clockwise) around the triangle two (2) times. Be sure to travel on the outside of the cones.

The first circuit will be at the walk and the second time at the trot.

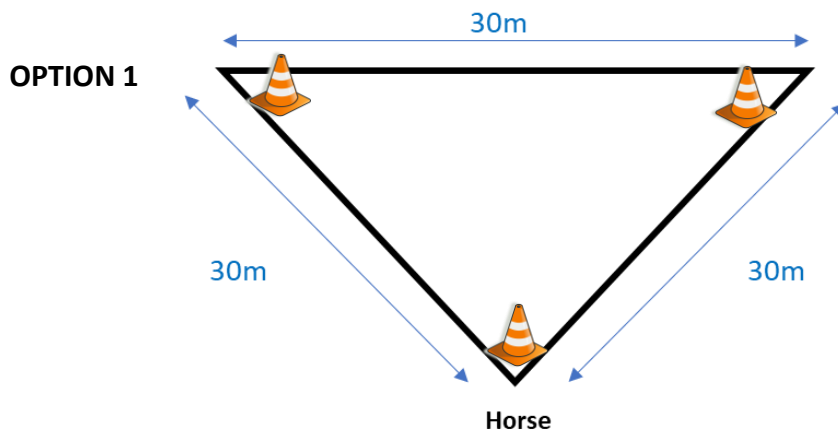
Dependent upon the space available, you have 2 options in which to set up the triangle.

Conformation View #2

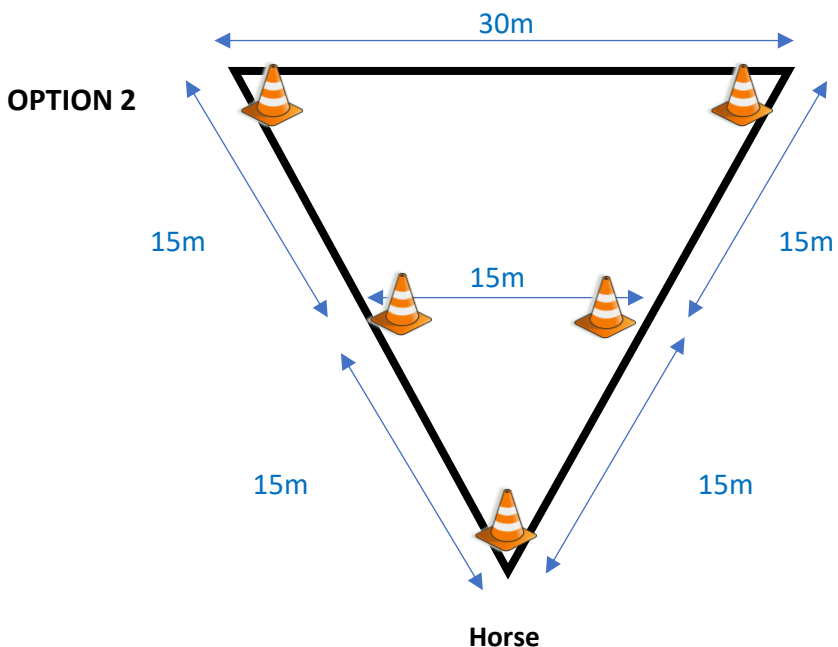
After the trot, show the right side of the horse, plus a view from the back and the front.

The camera can be moved to get the front and back views OR you can reposition the horse.



Camera Position

- Place a cone in each corner
- Horse travels clockwise around the outside of the cones.



Camera Position

- Place a cone in each corner and midway along each of the left and right sides.
- Horse travels at a walk clockwise around the outside of the cones marking the small 15m triangle.
- Horse then travels at a trot (clockwise) around the outside of the larger triangle.



Setting Up Your DRIVEN Dressage Ring

2-3 people make set-up faster and easier.

Print this guide and take it with you during set-up.

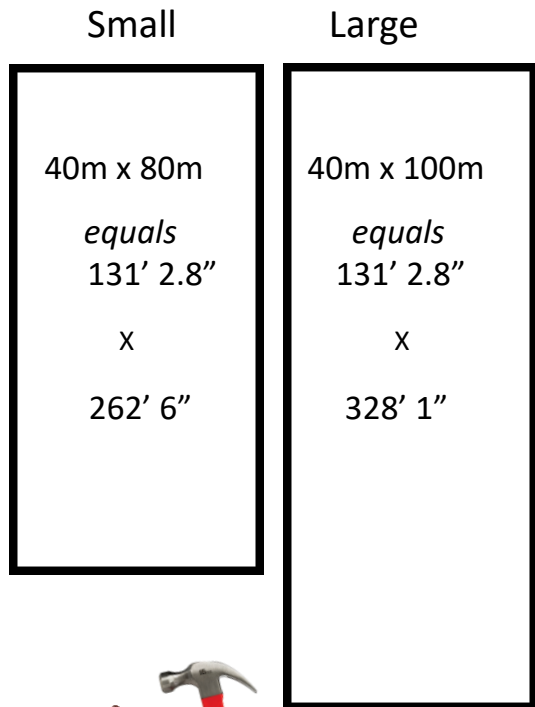
1. Determine where you ring will be placed.

The area should be as flat as possible. If desired, allow additional room to drive around the outside of the ring and for placement of the letters.

2. Gather your tools.

You will need the following:

- Stakes (4)
- Hammer (1)
- Masonry Line (400' for the small ring or 500' for the large ring)
- Tape Measure (min 10' with wide blade)
- Permanent Marker
- Long Tape Measure (300' for the small ring or 350' for the large ring)
- Electrical Tape (optional rail marker)



3. Set Your Corners and Rails

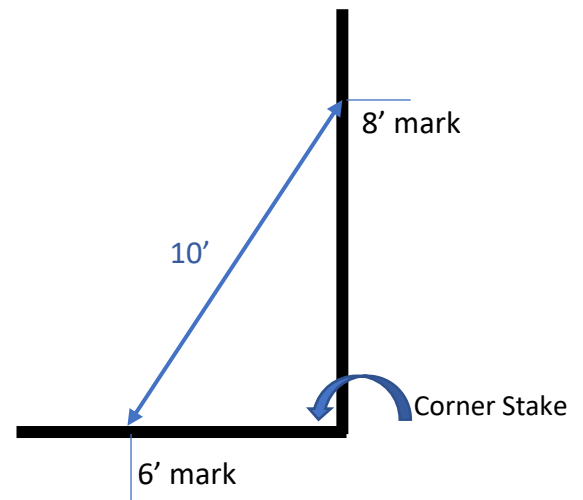
- Locate the position of one corner and drive a stake.
- Set the rails using the Pythagorean Theory.
- Mark 1 rail at 6', Mark the 2nd rail at 8'.
- Move the end of the rails until the diagonal line created by the marks equals 10'.

4. Stretch the masonry lines

- Place one along each of the long and short sides and secure to a stake. Place the stakes at the appropriate length of width of the ring you are building.
- Place your rails along these lines.

5. Set Your Next Corner and Rails

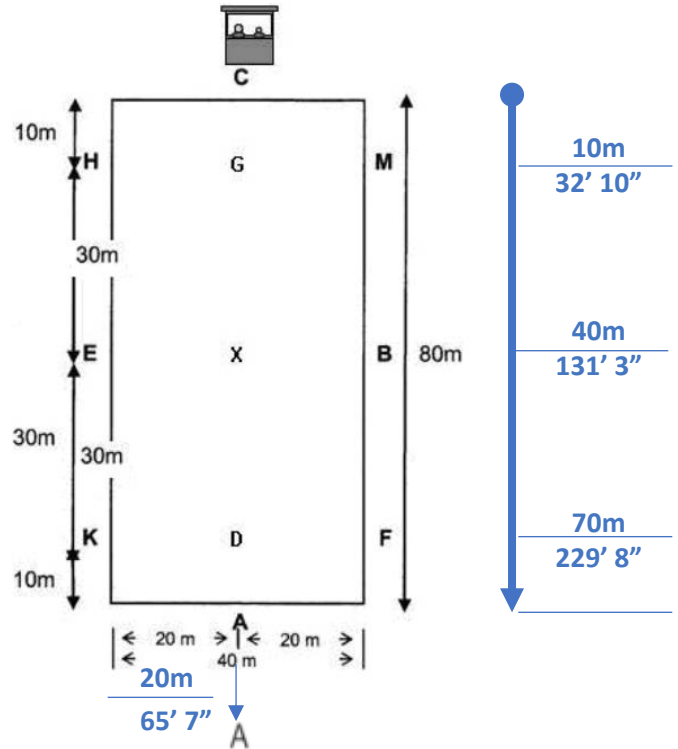
- Repeat step 3 & 4 for each of the next corners and sides.



Place The Letters

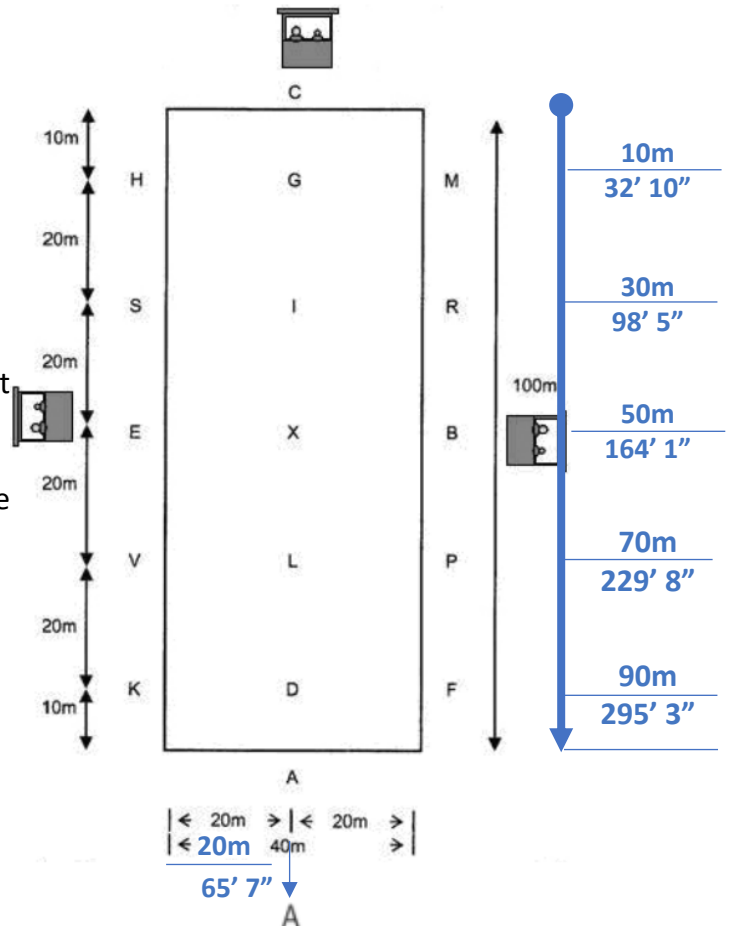
6a. In the SMALL ring:

- Place a mark on the long rail at the following distances from the corner:
 - M: 10m = 32' 10"
 - B: 40m = 131' 3"
 - F: 70m = 229' 8"
- Place your letters 2 feet from the rail at these marks
- Repeat on the other long side
- C is 20m (or 65' 7") in on the short side. Place that letter 2' from the rail as well.
- A is also 20m (or 65' 7") in on the short side. Place that letter away from the opening



6b. In the LARGE ring:

- Place a mark on the long rail at the following distances from the corner:
 - M: 10m = 32' 10"
 - R: 30m = 98' 5"
 - B: 50m = 164' 1"
 - P: 70m = 229' 8"
 - F: 90m = 295' 3"
- Place your letters 2 feet from the rail as these marks
- Repeat on the other long side
- C is 20m (or 65' 7") in on the short side. Place that letter 2' from the rail as well.
- A is also 20m (or 65' 7") in on the short side. Place that letter away from the opening



7. HINT: Mark the Rails (Optional):

Mark the letter points on the rails with a contrasting color of tape for more precision riding.

Amateur Status Declaration

To compete in Amateur classes in the Western Dressage Division, competitors are required to provide proof of Amateur status in one of three ways. Declaration can be made at www.spotlighthorsheshows.com

1. Submit a copy of amateur card from a recognized equestrian sports governing organization (USEF, AQHA, APHA etc.)

2. Attest that you are serving an internship for college credit through your respective accredited college program and have never held professional status.

3. Attest that you meet the qualifications below.

I attest that, after my 18th birthday, I have not:

- a) Accepted remuneration for riding, driving, showing, training, schooling, or conducting clinics or seminars.
- b) Accepted remuneration for giving riding or driving lessons, lessons in showmanship, instructions in equitation or horse training. (Persons acting as counselors at summer camps, who are not hired in the exclusive capacity of riding instructors, are excluded and persons giving instructions and training to the handicapped are also excluded).
- c) Accepted remuneration AND acted as an agent in the sale of a horse or pony or accepted a horse or pony on consignment for the purpose of sale or training that is not owned by me, my cohabitant, or family member, a farm/ranch/syndicate/partnership/corporation/business I, my cohabitant or family member controls.
- d) Accepted remuneration for the use of my name, photograph or other form of personal association as a horseman in connection with any advertisement or article to be sold.
- e) Accepted prize money in equitation or showmanship classes, except in amateur or owner classes.
- f) Advertised my professional services such as training or giving lessons by way of business cards, print ads, or internet. Exception: The writing of books or articles pertaining to horses.
- g) Accepted a token of appreciation, other than money, for riding, driving, or showing in hand in halter (tokens worth more than \$300 are considered remunerations)

Junior Status

Riders are eligible to compete as juniors if they are 17 years of age or less at the beginning of the competition year (which begins December 1st of the prior calendar year).

Open Classes

Any horse or rider may enter an open class if a junior or Amateur class is not available for that test. Example: Musical Freestyles are Open classes where Juniors, Amateurs, and Professionals compete together.

Any rider with a Professional rating may not enter Junior or Amateur classes.

GUIDELINES FOR GAITED HORSES

There are a significant number of gaited horse breeds (about 30 in North America), all with gaits specific to their breed. In Western Dressage competition, the gaited horse will perform a saddle gait in place of the jog. The saddle gait selected should be the gait in which the horse is balanced and athletically comfortable performing. The saddle gait is a 4 beat lateral or diagonal gait, timely and evenly performed. The tempo, rhythm and foot falls of the gait they choose to show must not change throughout the test. The true four beat gait the horse performs, should be able to be ridden in a working, lengthened, free and collected manner as the Western Dressage test calls for.

All rules can be found in the USEF Rule Book under Western Dressage.

WD106 Saddle Gait

The saddle gait has a noticeable increase in cadence from the working walk. Excessive speed or slowness will be penalized.

1. In lieu of a jog, gaited horses perform gaits of various rhythms and footfalls. The gaited horse will perform a saddle gait in place of the jog.
2. The saddle gait may be either a lateral or diagonal gait, timely and consistently performed. The tempo, rhythm and foot falls of the gait the rider chooses to perform must not change throughout the test. The gait the horse performs, should be able to be ridden in a working, lengthened, free and collected manner as the Western Dressage test specifies.
3. The quality of the saddle gait is judged by general impression, i.e. the regularity and rhythm of the steps, the cadence and impulsion. This quality originates from the horse having a supple back and well engaged hind quarters, and the ability to maintain the same rhythm and natural balance in all variations of the saddle gait.
 - a. Collected Saddle Gait. The horse, remaining “on the bit”, moves forward with the neck raised and arched and showing clear self-carriage. The head approaches the vertical position and a light contact is maintained with the mouth. The hocks are well-engaged and must maintain an energetic gliding impulsion, enabling the shoulders to move more freely. Although the horse’s steps are shorter than in the other saddle gaits, elasticity and cadence are not lessened.
 - b. Working Saddle Gait. With an energetic, regular consistent rhythm; the horse must go forward with consistent and elastic steps. The back must be relaxed and the shoulders free, while there is an obvious push from the hindquarters. The hind legs actively glide under the horse. The horse must show proper balance and maintain light contact with the bit. The horse’s nose must be on or slightly in front of the vertical.
 - c. Lengthening of Stride. This is a variation of the Working saddle gait; the horse covers more ground while maintaining the same tempo, consistent rhythm as in the Working saddle gait. Speeding up is a fault.
 - d. Free Saddle Gait. The Free saddle gait will show moderate lengthening of stride and frame compared to the Working saddle gait. Without hurrying, the horse goes forward with clearly lengthened steps, with impulsion from the hindquarters and uphill balance. The rider allows the horse to carry the head a little more in front of the vertical than at the Collected and the Working saddle gait. The horse’s neck is “out”, down and forward, with the nose slightly in front of the vertical, with a loose rein and the poll at approximately the same height as the wither (the neck is level). The steps should be consistent, the whole movement balanced and unconstrained, while maintaining a consistent rhythm.

The Sport predicate can be awarded to mares, gelding, and stallions that achieve good results in competitive sport. Sport can only be earned based on results achieved at shows registered with the "United States Equestrian Federation [USEF], United States Dressage Federation [USDF], Equestrian Canada, American Driving Society [ADS], Koninklijke Nederlands Hippische Sportfederatie/Royal Dutch Equestrian Federation (KNHS), and Spotlight Horse Shows [SHS]. The scores registered with USEF, USDF, ADS, Equestrian Canada, KNHS, and SHS determine qualification for the Sport predicate.

Divisions included in this show are Dressage and Driven Dressage.

Dressage: Scores must be from a test Third Level or higher

Driven Dressage: Scores must be from a single horse FEI test or any single horse Advanced ADS test with a canter movement

Easy to Enroll

- Owner & exhibitor/rider must be a current APHA or AjPHA member
- Individual memberships must be used for the exhibitor/rider, joint or ranch memberships cannot.
- Participants do not have to own the horse
